G. President's Remark and Board Comments

President Petrie shared information regarding the NSBA Advocacy and Equity Institute in Washington, D.C. that he attended along with Member Blackmon, Dr. Daveda Colbert and Mike Latvis.

President Petrie also shared that the Wayne County Association of School Boards (WCASB) General Membership meeting will be held February 20, 2025 at Wayne RESA.

Member Beri shared that U.S. Senator Gary Peters is hosting a Legislative Forum with Southern Wayne County Regional Chamber on February 24, 2025 at Crystal Gardens in

Southgate. RESA board members were invited to attend.

Member Blackmon announced SEMCOG elections will be held at the next meeting, and she has submitted for re-election.

President Petrie also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- Grosse Pointe Congratulations to Nathan M., Class of 2025, who designed graphics for the Grosse Pointe Farms' police vehicle stationed at Grosse Pointe South High School, in collaboration with Officer Jim Labeau and Art teacher, Alex Finney.
- Northville Congratulations to the Northville High School Aerospace Club who completed the Critical Design Review Presentation for their NASA Student Launch event in front of a panel of NASA engineers and National Association of Rocketry experts. The team received high praise and compliments for their preparedness, attention to detail, and overall engineering efforts.
 - Also, congratulations to Northville for their excellence in education. In the 2025 Niche Best Schools rankings, Northville Public Schools ranked #1 Best Place to Teach in Michigan, #2 Best School District in Michigan, and #3 District with the Best Teachers in Michigan. Congratulations to Northville's dedicated educators, outstanding students, and supportive community.
- Redford Union Congratulations to Redford Union Automotive Tech program.

 Community partners from Pat Milliken Ford and Bill Brown Ford donated a 2024 Ford Mustang and a 2024 Ford Raptor to the program. The vehicles will be used as hands-on resources for the auto-tech students

I. Presentations

- 1. Wayne RESA's Continuous Improvement Team: Supporting all Schools, Strengthening Success with a Tiered Approach Dr. Markita Hall, Executive Director of Educational Services; Dr. Angela Jack, Director of Continuous Improvement; and Dr. Carol Ann Paul, Manager of State & Federal Programs, and Special Populations presented on how the Continuous Improvement Team partners with districts to enhance student outcomes through systems development, equity and evidence-based strategies utilizing the Michigan Integrated Continuous Improvement Process (MICIP) and providing technical assistance aligning state and federal programs and supporting students experiencing homelessness and foster care.
- 2. Safe & Healthy Schools: Mental Health Supports & Partnerships Sharon Black-Johnson, School Outreach Nurse; Terri Czerwinski, Director of Safe & Healthy Schools; and Danielle Tagai, School Health/Social Work Consultant presented on the Safe and Healthy

Schools Department's enhanced areas of focus and partnership with Care Solace to provide mental health support. They also shared information on a special project, the implementation of the C4S (Care for Students) plans, with The James and Grace Lee Boggs School. Julia Putman, Principal and Amanda Rossman, Executive Director at The James and Grace Lee Boggs School shared positive experiences from partnering with Wayne RESA's Safe & Health Schools, Medicaid and MISTAR Teams and the impact the collaboration is having on their students.

J. Superintendent's Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis shared the following updates:

- Downriver Representative Rylee Linting serves as Vice Chair on the House Education and Workforce Committee.
- The Senate has sued the House regarding bills that were not sent to Governor by the House Speaker which included changes to PA152. There has been no action in the courts.
- Earned sick time changes and minimum wage changes are currently being worked on. Changes have been proposed by the Senate and the House.
- Executive budget recommendations were presented by the Governor. The recommendations include a proposed \$10,000 per pupil foundation allowance and \$94 million to provide a 4.1% increase in funding to support academically at-risk students, English language learners, career and technical education students, and students in rural school districts. The Governor also proposed \$150 million for school safety and mental health which would include new boilerplate requiring districts to opt in to allowing a state investigation in the event of a mass/tragic event occurs at their schools to receive funds.
- On the federal level, there are concerns regarding potential cuts to Title funding and Medicaid and potential dismantling of the U.S. Department of Education.
- A lawsuit is potentially headed to the Supreme Court challenging the constitutionality of Section 504.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared that the Michigan State Police were onsite at RESA performing an audit of the Criminal History Record Internet Subscription Service (CHRISS). RESA processes the greatest number of criminal history records or fingerprinting outside of a criminal justice agency in the state because of the services provide to constituent districts in terms of supporting both staff enrollment, substitute teachers, and transferring prints between districts.

Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan shared details regarding the 2024-25 Budget Amendments being presented for consideration and approval by the Board during the February meeting. Significant changes in the budgets for the General, Act 18, Special Education Operating, Medicaid, Cooperative, and Capital Projects funds were presented and discussed.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

• RESA continues to lead and serve in a time of constant change. After reviewing the latest letter from the U.S. Department of Education, while we agree that all students must have

access to an education free from discrimination, we await further clarity on the expectations of the department. We, in Wayne County, remain focused on providing engaging, safe, and healthy teaching and learning environments, where both staff and students can thrive.

- O As we continue to navigate the evolving landscape of Executive Orders with wide-ranging implications, including potential impacts on government departments such as the Department of Education, remaining calm and steadfast is essential. The belief remains that the Executive Orders continue to reshape history, bringing both profound change and hardship to many families, and in some cases, adds to the chaos of our daily lives because of the unknown.
- O While uncertainties persist, so too does our ability to adapt, advocate, and seek clarity. Hope and resilience will guide us forward, as legal challenges and advocacy efforts continue. Together, we will stay informed, engaged, and unwavering in our commitment to what matters most.
- The Wayne County Association of School Boards (WCASB) meeting is Thursday,
 February 20, 2025, 5:45 p.m. at Wayne RESA in Boyd Auditorium. RESA Leadership will be in attendance.
- RESA Board Members were asked to mark their calendars for the Wayne RESA All Staff
 meeting on Friday, February 28, 2025, at 8:30 a.m. The meeting link will be shared with
 board members.
- RESA is thankful for the increase in Wayne County school board members who attended the National School Board Association (NSBA) Advocacy & Equity Symposium in Washington, D.C. Wayne County Schools were well represented. The Wayne County school board members engaged in conversations with legislators and their staff regarding the executive orders, IDEA, cybersecurity, and appropriations. All parties agreed to keep the conversations going, recognizing that the topics discussed were priorities. It is imperative that we continue to advocate at the highest level.
- Wayne County's graduation rate for SY 2023-24 has increased by 1.14%, making the county's graduation rate 78.31% with the state's graduation rate 82.83%. Wayne County continues to work aggressively to close the gap, while improving outcomes.
- The "We are Wayne RESA" video has been updated. The final version is being previewed for approval for release. Special thanks to Dana Chicklas, Senior Executive Director of Communications, Public Relations, and Marketing; and Chris Slat, Videographer & Multimedia Consultant, for their amazing work.
- Thanks are extended to Sabrina Rudy, Special Populations Consultant, for her work in providing housing insecurity support to Wayne County Schools and families. The support, assistance and training being provided by the Special Populations department, led by Dr. Carol Ann Paul, Manager of State & Federal Programs, and Special Populations, has transitioned from good to great. Our efforts must continue because there is a need for resources and support throughout the county.
- RESA honors and acknowledges that February is Black History Month which encourages
 us to recognize and celebrate the legacy of the culture and the contributions of so many
 who have shaped our Nation's history.
- RESA also recognized National Counselor Week, which took place February 3 7. We salute and appreciate our Wayne RESA career counselors' team, and all our outstanding counselors throughout the county.

- Thanks are extended to the Wayne RESA Special Education and Early Intervention Services (SEEIS) Team who facilitated the Michigan Department of Education Office of Special Education Least Restrictive Environment visits throughout the county.
 - We celebrate the services provided to students and the great work that is taking place throughout the county.

N. General Board Comments

In honor of Black History Month, Member Blackmon shared the story of Sarah Roberts, a 5-year-old Black girl, who was turned away from five white schools in Boston. Her father, Benjamin, one of the nation's first Black American printers, sued the city. Robert Morris, one of the nation's first Black lawyers, and co-counsel Charles Sumner took the case that resulted in the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court upholding the racial segregation of public schools. The attorneys then took the issue to state lawmakers and in 1855, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts banned segregated schools, the first law barring segregated schools in the U.S.

Member Blackmon shared her support for Board Treasurer James Beri and Board Trustee Lynda Jackson, current members of the Board running for re-election.

Member Funderburg shared her appreciation for Wayne RESA staff for navigating during unsettling times and spoke peace and strength over each staff member to be able to persevere and be vigilant as we continue to serve Wayne County children.
