Regular Meeting March 19, 2025

MINUTES

A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President James Petrie on March 19, 2025, at 8:31 a.m.

B. Roll Call

C. Pledge of Allegiance

D. Approval of Agenda

Member Funderburg, supported by Member Jackson, moved to approve the agenda as presented. On voice vote, the motion carried 3-0.

- E. Public Participation None.
- **F.** Introduction of New Staff There were no new staff introductions.

G. President's Remark and Board Comments

Member Jackson shared that her two grandchildren graduated from Michigan State University and a third grandchild is in dental school, and they all are doing wonderful.

Member Funderburg had the opportunity to work with the MISTEM network at the Henry Ford Museum alongside Greg Johnson and Mari Treece, Donna McDowell and Krista McKinney-King in her work capacity. SEMCA partners with Wayne RESA and other partners throughout the county to offer Geospatial Information Systems (GIS) program opportunities, including summer internships. The programming includes flying drones and geographical mapping. Approximately eight high school students from Henry Ford Academy and Belleville High School participated along with Mia, a first generation student in Eastern Michigan University's GIS program. It was great to see the capstone projects students worked on throughout their internships and hear about Mia's experience from being in the program in high school and then having that segue her into her Eastern Michigan University experience.

Member Funderburg also shared that she had the opportunity to meet Barb Land from Square One Education Network, a non-profit that hosts many STEM competitions amongst the students.

Member Funderburg shared highlights from the Wayne County Association of School Board meeting held at RESA including hearing from colleagues about their experiences on having attended the NSBA Advocacy and Equity Symposium in Washington, D.C.

Member Blackmon informed the Board that SEMCOG elections will be held on Thursday, March 20 where they will be electing their educational representatives for the board of directors. Member Blackmon has sent her letters of interest in being reelected to the executive committee on behalf of the Wayne RESA Board.

Member Blackmon paid tribute to an outstanding citizen of the City of Detroit who passed away recently. Luther Keith was a journalist and jazz musician who established journalism scholarships for black students and mentored many of them. Mr. Keith was the first black editorial writer for the Detroit News and also founded Arise Detroit!, a nonprofit coalition promoting volunteerism, community activism and positive images to benefit the city. He created a kind of enthusiasm for being neighborly and proud of where you live.

Luther Keith passed away in his sleep just after he had given an outstanding performance at Baker's Keyboard Lounge in Detroit.

President Petrie congratulated Board Secretary Danielle Funderburg for her achievement of the MASB President's Award of Recognition. There are now three members of the RESA Board who have done all the coursework and met all requirements to achieve Level 7 - President's Award of Recognition. Member Funderburg joins Member Jackson and Member Blackmon in the marvelous accomplishment.

Last month, President Petrie was unable to deliver the welcome during the RESA All Staff meeting due to technical difficulties, so he shared a condensed version during the board meeting including how RESA has been about inclusion, diversity and equity for as long as he has served on the board, and how these concepts are fundamental and important to the organization.

President Petrie thanked Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert and others for their work on the weekly updates provided to the Board as they are well done and informative each week.

President Petrie also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- Crestwood Congratulations to Riverside Middle School 7th grade ELA teacher, Anne
 Clemente for being selected as a 2025 Fullbright Scholar. The Fullbright Teachers Global
 Classrooms Program is a year-long professional learning opportunity and short-term
 exchange for educators from the United Staes to develop skills to prepare students for a
 competitive global economy. Ms. Clemente was invited to Washington, D.C. in February
 and will be traveling with her cohort to Uruguay in June.
- DPSCD –Congratulations to both Cass Technical High School and Sampson-Webber
 Leadership Academy for their outstanding performances at the 2025 State Chess
 Championship at Oakland University. Cass Tech Chess Team, 2025 State Champions U1000 Section and 2nd Place Open Section; and Sampson-Webber Chess Team, 2025 State
 Champions U600 Section (3-way tie).
- Grosse Pointe Congratulations to 39 Grosse Pointe South Choir students who toured New York City from February 14-19. They performed at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, took a vocal masterclass, and enjoyed a choreography workshop with Broadway's Mariah Reeves.

- Melvindale-North Allen Park Melvindale is remembering a hometown hero who made
 the ultimate sacrifice to protect his community. Police Cpl. Mohamed Said died in the line of
 duty and his legacy has carried on in the community where he grew up. A new
 elementary school for 4th and 5th grade students in Melvindale-Northern Allen Park Public
 Schools will open in the fall 2025 to honor him Mohamed Said Elementary. It is the site
 of the former Strong Middle School.
- **Plymouth-Canton** Congratulations to the East Middle School Mathcounts team for taking home the 1st place trophy at the Detroit Metro Mathcounts Chapter Competition on February 15 at University of Michigan-Dearborn.
- Redford Union Congratulations to Redford Union School District on their partnership with Lawrence Technological University starting in the fall of 2025. This collaboration will provide early college & career readiness for Redford Union students, including opportunities to earn dual enrollment credits.

H. Communications

I. Presentations

- 1. Special Recognitions The following leaders were honored and recognized by Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert and the Wayne RESA Board of Education as award winners and true champions for children and education.
 - Mari Treece, Executive Director of Educational Services as the recipient of the 2025
 Michigan Reading Association's Administrator Award.
 - Terri Czerwinski, Director of Safe and Health Schools, for being named the 2025 Michigan School Nurses Association School Nurse Administrator of the Year.
- 2. A Systematic Approach to Improving Mathematics Outcomes in Wayne County Dr. Kristi Hanby, Mathematics Education Consultant and Mari Treece, Executive Director, Educational Services presented Wayne County math trends in comparison to the state average and shared successes on leveraging outcomes through COSA systems, rolling out the Essential Instructional Practices in Early Mathematics (PreK-5) thanks to an opportunity from Wayne County Executive funds. Dr. Hanby and Ms. Treece also presented a curriculum adoption process in partnership with Ed Reports for evidence-based instructional resources, next steps and other partnerships.
- 3. Elevating Outcomes Through Partnerships Krista McKinney-King, Director, Workforce Development, CTE, Adult Ed & Career Counseling; Rhonda Turner, Career Technical/Adult Education Consultant; and Stacia Weeks, Career Readiness & Counselor Consultant shared collaboration action in 2024 including advocacy and leadership, community and educational partnerships, and mental health training and support. They presented the impact of career counselor partnerships, post-secondary success navigation and the Wayne County Coalition

for future aviation and aeronautics programs and the Regional Consortium Charter with a review of the year one timeline and milestones.

J. Superintendent's Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis shared the following updates:

- On the federal level, two of the main and most concerning changes that are expected are related to funding cuts and vouchers and how they will use the American system process and budget process to encourage vouchers into states.
 - One major question is will the President issue an executive order pertaining to the U.S. Department of Education. Currently, the department staff has been cut from about 4100 to approximately 2200 staff remaining. There are concerns about how this will impact Michigan, both with the State Department and Wayne County districts, as there is continued conversations about shifting all regulatory and oversight responsibilities to state departments.
- On the state level, without knowing when a budget will be received, state legislators are being asked to essentially plan for cuts. About 9% of the state's school aid budget is from the federal government and if there is 25% cut from that, it equates to about half a billion dollars a year. Legislators are being asked to add money to the school aid reserve fund to essentially offset two years of federal budget cuts so that students are not impacted.
 - o Typically, the House and Senate versions of the school aid budgets are presented by the end of April, but the expectation is it will probably be another month before we start to see some things in writing.
- The House has pushed out an education plan. Many of the bills have been crafted by Launch Michigan.

Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

- Several RESA team members are presenting multiple sessions during the MACUL Conference being held March 19-21, 2025 in Detroit.
- Section 35m of the School Aid Budget provided \$87 million in a statewide investment for core instructional materials, professional learning and intervention materials for K-5 literacy. It called upon the state to convene a literacy committee of experts to lead the process of vetting the materials to create a ranked list that will be used to differentiate the amount of money that applying districts will receive. Beth is serving on the Michigan Department of Education's Committee for Literacy Achievement reviewing professional learning materials for literacy. The RESA team has been connecting with local district leaders regarding their comprehensive literacy efforts and hearing from them about their priorities in terms of what they want to take advantage of. RESA will align with the state's process for this grant and support a set of districts.
- Educational Services is leading an innovative project with the multilingual and instructional technology teams creating an innovative project working in partnership with Van Buren Public Schools. The project highlights ways to reach the needs of the non-English speaking families and engage them using AI technology around real time language translation that understands different dialects and helps to convey the emotions of the person speaking. The team applied for the 2024-25 Google GSV Fellowship Transformational Opportunity Lookbook was selected as one of 10 organizations nationally to be part of the ASU/GSV Education Innovative Showcase and pitch their idea to potentially win the grand prize.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- An action item was submitted to the board for consideration regarding Public Act 101 that requires an ISD in conjunction with its constituent districts to adopt a common calendar that identifies dates for winter and spring holiday breaks for the next five years. A common calendar recommendation with the addition of school year 2029-2030 was developed, following the same format as previously approved calendars. The recommended calendar was presented to the Wayne County LEA Superintendents for review and was adopted during their March 14 meeting. It was also presented during the March LEA/PSA Superintendents' meeting.
- An action item was submitted to the board for consideration to approve the appointment of Ms. Adrienne Kubicki for the Director of Special Education and Early Intervention Services position, effective March 3. Ms. Kubicki has been serving as a Wayne RESA Special Education consultant since November 2022. Prior to joining RESA, Ms. Kubicki served as the principal of the Joe Brighton Skills Center and as a teacher in Wyandotte Public Schools.

Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan shared the following updates:

- The budget process will begin with an April presentation to the RESA Board of Education, followed by the May presentation for constituent districts, and the formal adoption of the budget in June.
- The Excellence of Transportation annual dinner has been scheduled for Saturday, April 26, 2025 at Crystal Gardens in Southgate. Details will be shared with the board in the next weekly update.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- Congratulations to the Wayne County educators who won awards at the 2025 Michigan Science Teachers Association (MSTA) Conference: Jessica Mahl (South Redford) was a finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science; Crystal Brown (Gibraltar) was the MSTA Lifetime Service Award winner; Danielle Stephens (Plymouth-Canton) was the MSTA Teacher of Promise Award winner. Kudos to all of the phenomenal science educators in Wayne County and also those who presented at the MSTA Conference from Wayne RESA.
- Kudos to each of the amazing RESA team members who are presenting during the Michigan Association for Computer Users in Learning (MACUL) Conference this week in Detroit.
- Congratulations to Terry Czerwinski for being selected as the 2025 Michigan School Nurses Association School Nurse Administrator of the Year.
- Congratulations to Mari Treece for being selected as the 2025 Michigan Reading Association's Administrator Award recipient.
- Congratulations to the Wayne RESA Board of Education for receiving the Distinguished Achievement Award from the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB). The RESA Board continues to serve at the highest level, while modeling the standard of excellence.

- Congratulations to Wayne RESA Board Secretary, Danielle Funderburg, for receiving the MASB President's Award of Recognition joining previous recipients on the RESA Board, Lynda Jackson and Mary Blackmon. It is an honor to have Presidential Award winners that represent and model servant leadership and excellence at Wayne RESA.
- March is National Reading Month. Wayne RESA and Wayne County Schools highlight literacy each and every day in all disciplines. Literacy is key, fundamental, and foundational for our scholars, their families and the community.
- March is also National Social Work Month. RESA highlights and recognizes school social workers across the county and social work in general, locally, statewide and nationally. It is paramount that we lean into the mental health of our students and our educators to ensure that everyone is well, mentally and physically, so that we can all maximize our full potential. When educators maximize their full potential, then our scholars maximize their full potential.
- RESA recognizes the Multilingual Team for continuing to provide resources for each member
 of our diverse community in Wayne County. They recently shared resources for Ramadan and
 continue to share resources for all of our students and families.
- It is imperative that RESA continues to celebrate and highlight all things in March including Women's History Month and International Women's Day. RESA salutes, celebrates, and recognizes each of the women throughout this great county, state, nation, and especially those inside of our schools/districts, and within the RESA organization.
- RESA highlights the Livonia Early Childhood Center where Governor Whitmer took a tour and held a press conference recognizing the early childhood enrollment numbers in Michigan and the great work taking place in the Pre-K for all initiative in the Great Start Readiness Programs (GSRP). Livonia represented excellence at every turn hosting the tour for the Governor and her team and the Executive Director of Mileap, Dr. Beverly Walker-Griffea, and members from the Mileap team.
 - Dr. Walker-Griffea has requested additional visits to GSRP programs in Wayne County. Visits will be scheduled in May for the MiLEAP team to continue to hear from GSRP providers, their students and families about the excitement around preschool and how we can look forward to removing barriers for families as we continue to ensure that all four year olds in Wayne County are connected to free, high quality, research based programming for early childhood.
- The RESA Board of Education site visits are scheduled for April 23, 2025, at the Livonia Early Childhood Center, May 1, 2025 at the Beacon School in Taylor (Lincoln Park Schools), and August 20, 2025 visiting the RESA Assistive Technology Department at Burger Baylor School.
- Kudos to the team who planned and executed the RESA All Staff meeting held February 28, 2025 which received rave reviews. Author Shawn Achor spoke about The Happiness Advantage/Orange Frog initiative. There were budget and legislative updates along with a breakout session of gratitude where staff members shared gratitude for others inside the organization. We look forward to the Fall meeting with presentations by each department.
- The School Finance Research Foundation (SFRF) released the Michigan Schools Facilities
 Study report the morning of March 19, 2025 to reporting agencies consisting of Senator
 Darrin Camilleri, Chair, Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on PreK-12; Representative
 Tim Kelly, Chair, House Appropriations Subcommittee on School Aid and Department of

Education; the state budget director, the House and Senate fiscal agencies, and State Superintendent, Dr. Michael Rice. The report shows less than 1% of the school buildings in this state are in need of being replaced versus repaired. We should be excited about the stewardship of the dollars that districts raise and how districts are maintaining facilities, some that are extremely aged, at the best of their ability with the dollars that they receive. The hope from this report is that schools and districts will be appropriately funded in terms of capital needs. A media press conference will be held on March 20, 2025.

- The RESA Board will hold a Study Session immediately following the April Board meeting for the purpose of accreditation. Cognia would like feedback from the Board of Education as RESA continues the accreditation process.
- As things continue to change in our country, Wayne RESA will continue to follow both federal
 and state laws and where there is conflict in the language, we will seek clarity from the
 attorney general and continue to seek legal counsel. We will continue to remain calm, focused,
 and resilient, as we continue the work, while meeting the unique needs of our diverse county.
