MINUTES

A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President Mary Blackmon on July 16, 2025, at 8:44 a.m., immediately following the Organizational Meeting.

Member Beri, with support from Member Petrie, moved to approve the agenda as presented. The motion passed with a voice vote of 4-0.

G. President's Remark and Board Comments

President Mary Blackmon shared that she had the opportunity to meet Tuskegee Airmen at her neighborhood association meeting. She reflected on their contributions, linking them to the Davis Aerospace program in Detroit. President Blackmon also recalled meeting Benjamin O. Davis during the opening of the Davis Aerospace Center.

President Blackmon lifted the transition of Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) Board Member Angelique Peterson-Mayberry to the Wayne County Commission and her positive contributions to DPSCD.

Member Petrie commented on the success of the first day of the board retreat, sharing his appreciation for discussions on current initiatives and future plans. He thanked all involved and praised the positive atmosphere.

In response to President Blackmon's comments, Member Petrie shared a historical note about the Tuskegee Airmen (Red Tails) and their WWII record of protecting bombers.

Member Jackson spent five days at Virginia State University with 43 students (ages 13–17) as part of the National Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE) Youth Leadership Summit. Students were able to experience campus life and meet professional mentors (judges, superintendents, professors, entrepreneurs). Ms. Jackson mentioned that during her involvement, the national youth leadership summit has visited nine different universities in nine years.

President Blackmon also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- **Hamtramck** – Congratulations to first-generation Hamtramck High School senior, M. Begum, who was accepted to Harvard on a full ride. Begum plans to major in Neuroscience with a secondary in Global Health and Health Policy, hoping to tackle global health disparities and improve women's health access across the world.
- **DPSCD** – Congratulations to Detroit Public Schools Community District students who made history in June, taking top honors at the inaugural Great Lakes International Youth Chess Cup in Toronto. The Detroit City Chess Club brought home multiple individual wins and the overall team championship trophy.
- Also, Congratulations to Adhm A., who was named Michigan's Exemplary Youth of the Year at the 2025 Career Development Conference. Adhm is the valedictorian of his graduating class of 200 students at Cody High School and has earned a \$50,000 scholarship to Wayne State University. He plans to study criminal justice with the goal of becoming a lawyer.
- **Northville** – Congratulations to Northville seniors Laura F. and Andrea A. who took top honors in the 12th grade division at the RTX Invention Convention U.S. Nationals at The Henry Ford. Their invention is an AI skin color detection and moisture hydration 2-in-1 customizable foundation – a smart, inclusive beauty solution.
- **Wayne-Westland** - Congratulations to the Wayne-Westland K-8 STEM Center and the students from John Glenn High School, Graham Elementary, and Schweitzer Elementary for their hard work and dedication in this year's Salmon Release program. Students raised salmon from hatchlings and had the unique opportunity to release them into the Rouge River last month. Their efforts in environmental education and conservation were recognized by U.S. Congressman Shri Thanedar.

H. Communications – No communications were submitted to the Board.

I. Superintendent's Report

Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis

Mr. Latvis shared the following updates:

On the State level –

- No significant new education legislation or policy changes reported.
- Only 15 Public Acts signed into law in Michigan in the first half of 2025, an unusually low number.
- Michigan Legislature has not passed a budget as of July 16; budget negotiations are ongoing.

- Approximately 89% of the state budget is agreed upon between House and Senate; the remaining 11% is unresolved.
- There is concern that a final state budget may not be passed until September or October, potentially causing a government shutdown.

On the Federal level –

- Federal reconciliation package passed but does not include the full budget.
- Medicaid cuts will reduce Michigan's general fund by \$450 million this fiscal year, with growing impacts projected in future years.
 - Wayne County receives \$30 million in Medicaid school reimbursements annually.
- Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has frozen \$6 billion in appropriated federal education funds.
 - This includes funds for English learners, teacher development, and afterschool programs.
 - Michigan may be impacted by \$160–170 million in frozen federal funds.
- A Continuing Resolution (CR) at the federal level is expected due to budget disagreements.
- The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in favor of allowing layoffs of 1,400 Department of Education staff.
- There are discussions about restructuring the Department of Education and shifting responsibilities to other agencies or states.
- These changes may delay federal grant processing and increase workload for regional educational service agencies (RESAs/ISDs).

Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services, Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez shared the following updates:

- Literacy and STEM “Lit Labs” are running across 20 districts, including DPSCD, for rising K–3 students.
 - Over 210 teachers trained for the program.
 - Pop-up Lit Labs are also being hosted weekly at two Detroit Public Library branches.
 - Participation numbers are in the thousands.
- Michigan appropriated \$87M for literacy grants, with one focused on innovative literacy efforts and the other on purchasing high-quality instructional materials and professional learning.
 - 66 Wayne County districts submitted applications by the July 10 deadline.
 - A two-day Curriculum Implementation Institute is scheduled for early August.
- Wayne RESA Early Childhood Center preparations are underway at Burger.
 - The Assistive Technology team will relocate by mid-August to enable construction.
 - A data driven report showed service gaps in early childhood care in the area.
- The Teaching Diverse History Summit is being held Auguts 13-14, 2025 in Detroit and will include participation from State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice and other education leaders.
- An AI advisory committee has identified four priority tools for potential adoption by districts.
 - Wayne RESA is pursuing consortia pricing to reduce costs and support implementation.
 - Some districts are evaluating current subscriptions to offset costs.

- Free or low-cost AI tools are being used by many educators.

Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- Details were provided on the following action item presented to the Board for consideration:
 - Appointment of Elizabeth Santor as Executive Director of Special Education Early Intervention Services.
- Orange Frog training sessions occurred on: April 15–16, May 12, June 19, June 24, July 9–10. Key themes identified from training include:
 - Improved collaboration and communication.
 - Belief that happiness enhances interpersonal dynamics and productivity.
 - Happiness linked to being more approachable and responsive to external partners.
 - Emotional well-being seen as driving innovation and performance.
 - Widespread notion that happiness is contagious and has a ripple effect across stakeholders.

A core team of 17 employees will convene to:

- Review identified themes.
- Develop recommendations and action plans.

Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan

Mr. McMechan shared the following budget information/updates:

- The finance team is focused on closing out the previous fiscal year and preparing and launching the new fiscal year.
- Transportation training for bus drivers and supervisors is underway. The summer months are used to renew certifications and provide training for thousands of bus drivers.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- The 2025–2026 school year is officially opened, and Wayne RESA has already moved from planning to execution. We have transitioned seamlessly with a full agenda for the new school year.
 - Today, a candidate has been presented to the Board for an appointment as Executive Director of Special Education and Early Intervention Services.
 - Encouragement is in the air, though fiscal challenges remain. Ongoing concerns about both state and federal funding persist across our districts. Districts have been encouraged to continue to do what they know is best, because schools will open and scholars will arrive ready to learn. RESA remains committed to supporting our constituents throughout the county, while urging state leaders to do what is right for our students, families, communities, and educators.
- Gratitude was extended to the RESA board, legislative team and each district and community for their continued advocacy. Whether it is to denounce federal cuts to Medicaid, or the impact of block grants being proposed for McKinney-Vento funding, or cuts to Title funding, concerns have been expressed about the anxiety that is being created and the harm this will do to students and communities alike. RESA stands committed to promoting public education, as it remains the backbone of this country, and it holds deep importance for us in Michigan.

- Last week, Dr. Colbert and Mike Latvis, Sr. Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, attended the AASA Legislative Advocacy Conference in Washington, D.C. Michigan was well represented, with new appointments to the Legislative Governing Board, and Dr. Colbert appointed to the AASA Executive Committee. RESA will continue advocating at every level of government.
- The Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) continues to stand strong, and RESA encourages all families with four-year-olds to enroll. GSRP offers free, research-based programming that supports academic and social-emotional development, laying a strong foundation for kindergarten and beyond. RESA is especially excited about our GSRP addition and looks forward to the 2026 opening of four-year-old classrooms serving as a top tier training lab for educators and support staff.
- State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice has announced his retirement, and the statewide search for his successor is now in progress. The posting went live on June 25, 2025, and interviews are scheduled for mid-August. The full timeline and process are available on the Michigan Department of Education's website. The goal is to have the new Superintendent in place by October 4, 2025.
- Congratulations to Wayne RESA on achieving Cognia accreditation. The following excerpt from Cognia's June 29, 2025 communication was shared with the Board:
- *We are delighted to inform you that your institution has been awarded Accredited status by the North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement (NCA CASI), the Northwest Accreditation Commission (NWAC), and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI). The three listed regional agencies provide your institution with a highly regarded accreditation that is recognized throughout the world. This action was conferred by the Cognia Global Commission on June 26, 2025.*

This accreditation extends five years beyond the previous term ending June 30, 2025. The achievement reflects the collective efforts of RESA Cabinet members, departmental teams, consultants, and Board members who participated in Cognia's interview process.

 - Special thanks to Kurt Rheame for his expertise and proficiency in managing the technological components.
 - Thanks to Dana Chicklas for her attention to detail and coordination of all submitted materials.
 - Appreciation to Deputy Superintendents Kelly Bohl and Beth Gonzalez for their leadership on the accreditation review process, coordinating teams, collecting data, and overseeing submission, with Kurt streamlining the process.
 - Gratitude to Cabinet members, Drew McMechan, Dr. Jennifer Taiariol, Mike Latvis, and Rob McCoy, for their contributions to ensure that we showcased all of the data and information on how RESA partners, collaborates, and leads in alignment with our vision and mission.
 - Additional thanks to Tiesha Hakim for coordinating meetings and providing support to the team.
 - Kudos to each department and every team member for their intentional focus on improving outcomes. Everyone is responsible for the accreditation review process status. Each person plays a role in our success. Thanks to all for their continued service.
- Congratulations to Khalil El Saghir, RESA Multilingual Consultant, on his election to the National Association of English Learner Program Administrators. Khalil will serve as Vice President for 2025–2026 and transition to President the following year. He joins three other Michigan educators elected to national positions: Kelly Alvarez (Treasurer), Wassam Abdelaziz, and Dr. Isabel Haller-Gryc (Members-at-Large).

- Dr. Colbert also addressed questions related to immunizations, sharing that the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services continues to recommend routine immunizations, including recommending the COVID-19 vaccination for everyone ages 6 months and older. This aligns with long-standing guidance from the American Academy of Pediatrics. Vaccinations remain one of the most effective ways to prevent serious illnesses, hospitalization, and death from vaccine-preventable diseases.
- RESA is excited for the academic year ahead. The Wayne County Schools Superintendents' Association Opening Retreat is scheduled for the second week of August, and the full calendar of Wayne County LEA/PSA Superintendents' meetings has been scheduled. RESA will continue to support all districts and district leadership and looks forward to an outstanding school year of service, leadership, and collaboration in excellence.


