**MINUTES**

**A. Call to Order**

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President James Petrie on June 11, 2025 at 8:38 a.m., immediately following the Budget Presentation.

**B. Roll Call**

**D. Approval of Agenda**

Member Beri, supported by Member Funderburg, moved to approve the agenda as presented. On voice vote, the motion carried 4-0.

**G. President's Remark and Board Comments**

**Member Blackmon** congratulated Members James Beri and Lynda Jackson on their reelection to the Wayne RESA Board of Education. The Board is very happy that they decided to continue their tenure. They both make tremendous contributions for the students and staff in Wayne County.

Member Blackmon also reported that the SEMCOG General Assembly will be held on June 12, 2025. There will also be a formal election for members of the SEMCOG Board from the education sector.

**Member Beri** shared that he participated in a webinar with SEMCOG and there were discussions and questions about current legislative affairs and uncertainties regarding education.

**Member Funderburg** congratulated Wayne County's 2025 graduates, including her nephew, Aaron Walters, Jr., a graduate of South Redford's Thurston High School.

**Member Blackmon** attended Henry Ford Academy's 2025 graduation and shared that the graduating class received over \$27 million in scholarships. The graduation was very uplifting and Member Blackmon was pleased to be able to attend on behalf of the Board. RESA

Superintendent, Dr. Daveda Colbert gave outstanding remarks and former principal/superintendent Cora Christmas was in attendance.

**President Petrie** thanked Members James Beri and Lynda Jackson for continuing their service on the RESA Board of Education and complimented RESA administration for how wonderfully the Biennial RESA Board Election was handled.

**President Petrie** also shared the following highlights from Wayne County Schools –

- **Allen Park** – Congratulations to Allen Park High School's Ms. Singleton and the Allen Park Players who won the Educational Theatre Association Outstanding Impact Award. Also, congratulations to Allen Park Coaches, Andrew de Haan, Zach Murray, and Matthew de Haan, who were honored as heroes. Their quick thinking, calm under pressure, and training in CPR, along with access to an AED, saved a student-athlete's life.
- **DPSCD** – Congratulations to Superintendent Dr. Nikolai Vitti who earned the inaugural 2024 Skillman Visionary Award from the Skillman Foundation for reimagining Detroit's public schools.  
Also, congratulations to KrisTiana D., a senior at Southeastern High School in Detroit, who has been accepted to Johns Hopkins University with an impressive 4.18 GPA.
- **Flat Rock** - Congratulations to Flat Rock High School junior, Joey P. on a successful donation drive. Joey found sponsors for 34 plushies that he presented to the Guidance Center's Kid's Talk Program.
- **Garden City** – Congratulations to students in Mr. Nitzkowski's Graphics 3 and 4 classes at Garden City High School who competed in MITES (Michigan Industrial & Technology Education Society). For the first time ever, they had the Grand Champion, Maranda B., whose project was judged to be the best of more than 400 projects entered in the Graphic Art competition.
- **Northville** - Congratulations to Northville High School Girls Tennis Team – the 2025 Division 1 State Champions.
- **Wayne-Westland** - Congratulations to the Adams Middle School Drone Team. The team took 1st place in the Autonomous Drone Program at a recent competition.
- Congratulations to the Class of 2025 graduates across Wayne County, and throughout the state of Michigan. The Wayne RESA Board of Education wishes you continued success in all your future endeavors.

**H. Communications** – None.

**I. Presentations**

1. **"In Class Is Where It's At!" Good Attendance Campaign** – Dana Chicklas, Sr. Executive Director of Communications, shared an update on the award-winning good attendance campaign, developed in partnership with Wayne RESA, Oakland Schools, and Macomb ISD. The campaign, which earned a Silver Telly Award for Public Service/PSA, uses data and student voice to raise awareness, promote engagement, and emphasize the importance of regular school attendance.
2. **Capital Projects Update** – Robert Burke, Executive Director of Operations and Technology; and Rob McCoy, Senior Executive Director of Operations and IT Infrastructure shared highlights of recent facility and technology improvements, including IT server room upgrades, GSRP classroom construction at Burger Baylor,

Beacon School renovations, perimeter fencing, and updates to the Education Center and Annex. Technology updates included new security cameras, safer door replacements, updated meeting and desktop technology, and a Windows 11 rollout. They also reported faster IT support and a shorter device lifecycle.

3. **Michigan Statewide School Facilities Study** – Steven Ezikian, Executive Director of the School Finance Research Foundation (SFRF), presented findings from Michigan’s first state-funded K-12 school facilities study. Covering 93% of eligible schools, the 18-month study assessed key building components to guide cost-effective improvements for health, safety, and wellness. District-level reports will support local capital planning, with a statewide energy audit planned for summer 2025.

#### **J. Superintendent’s Report**

##### **Senior Executive Director of Legislative Affairs, Mike Latvis**

Mr. Latvis shared the following State and Federal Budget updates:

- House Republicans proposed a \$12,000 per-pupil budget, though much of the increase comes from eliminating/rolling up categoricals (e.g., CTE, transportation, meals) that would no longer be additional revenues. The proposal also includes:
  - A special education increase offset by reductions in ISD equalization (Section 56),
  - Hold-harmless provisions for ISDs are unclear regarding duration (one-time or ongoing).
  - Mandates for School Resource Officers (SRO) and mental health staff not matched by targeted line-item funding.
  - Some school aid funds are directed to private schools, raising legal concerns.
- Budget negotiations are expected to continue past the July 1 deadline.
- Federally, Title I remains flat-funded while IDEA receives a \$677 million increase. Several federal programs are proposed to be consolidated into a reduced \$2 billion block grant; notable eliminations include Title I, Part C (migrant education), Title III (ELL), Title II and IV (professional development), McKinney-Vento, community schools supports.
- Concerns have been lifted about federal voucher-like tax provisions promoting private and homeschool options.

##### **Deputy Superintendent of Administrative Services, Kelly Bohl**

Ms. Bohl shared the following updates:

- Ratification of WCSSF/AFT Local 4479 contract (July 1, 2025–June 30, 2028) and ASFCME Local 1882 (July 1, 2025–June 30, 2026) were submitted on the June agenda for board consideration for approval. A review of the contract negotiations and compensation adjustments were provided to the Board.
- Compensation increases for non-bargaining (admin and part-time) employees was also submitted on the June agenda for board consideration for approval.

##### **Assistant Superintendent of Financial Services, Drew McMechan**

Mr. McMechan shared the following budget information/updates:

- The final 2024-25 budget amendments and preliminary 2025-26 budget were submitted on the June agenda for board consideration for approval. Key items include reallocation of Inkster tax revenue to absorbing districts, increased interest revenue designated for one-time facility projects, write-offs of uncollectible GSRP payments from closed

providers, and increased Act 18 Fund revenue from Brownfield and Medicaid sources.

**Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert**

Dr. Daveda Colbert shared:

- As we approach the end of the 2024-2025 school year, the year has not slowed down.
  - The Wayne RESA Biennial Board Election was held on June 2, and we are excited to have James Beri and Lynda Jackson re-elected for six-year terms. Dr. Colbert shared that she is honored to continue to serve alongside each of the members of the Wayne RESA Board of Education.
  - Wayne County School Boards voted during their May 2025 meetings to approve the Wayne RESA 2025-2026 Budget. It is a testament of the leadership of each of the Wayne County Boards of Education to participate in the process of reviewing and taking action on the Wayne RESA budget.
    - Thanks are extended to the Wayne RESA Board of Education, and the Finance Team and Assistant Superintendent Drew McMechan for their leadership and support.
  - Wayne County School Boards also voted in May to designate a representative to cast votes in the Wayne RESA Biennial Election. RESA is grateful for the school board members who were able to participate in that process on June 2nd.
  - RESA is thankful for the girls' flag football championship that took place last Sunday, June 1 at Ford Field. Michigan added girls flag football and Wayne County Schools have joined. Dr. Colbert attended and supported two Wayne County teams in the championships, Redford Union High School and Gibraltar Carlson High School. Although they did not come home with a championship win, they are both champions to us and Wayne County congratulates them on their competitive attitude and spirit. These female athletes demonstrated grit throughout the entire season, and for that we celebrate them as our champions.
  - Dr. Colbert presented at the Institute for Education Innovation Symposium that was held in downtown Detroit. She had the opportunity to participate on a panel with the State Board of Education President, Dr. Pamela Pugh, as well as Kevin Polston, Kentwood School District Superintendent. The panel was moderated by the superintendent of Ypsilanti School District, Dr. Alena Zachary-Ross. Dr. Nikolai Vitti, DPSCD Superintendent, served as one of the keynote speakers during the two-day event. Topics included the state and federal education budget, great things happening and challenges in education, as well as a need for an accountability system that is achievable with the proper support.
  - On Monday, June 2, Dr. Colbert, Beth Gonzalez and Dr. Jennifer Taiariol traveled to Dearborn Public Schools where the State Board president visited the Dearborn School District and their special education programs. Dr. Maleyko, Dearborn Public Schools Superintendent and his team are modeling equity and excellence in education at every level, and State Board President Dr. Pugh was able to observe high quality co-teaching in a middle school setting, and other research-based strategies to improve student achievement for all students during the visit.
  - On Wednesday, June 4, Dr. Colbert was invited to be a part of the opening of the Detroit Service Learning Academy Command Center while they hosted an active shooter training drill. The Detroit Police Department were active participants in the drill. The Detroit Police Department Assistant Chief was with guests as they watched the drill from monitors. Wayne County Sheriff Raphael Washington, along with Chiefs and staff from Detroit and Southfield Police and Fire

Departments and the Wayne County Community College District Director of Public Safety were also in attendance. Kudos to the Detroit Service Learning Academy for their vision and intentional focus on school safety. Healthy and safe learning environments are vitally important to the overall success of schools and districts, as they prioritize improving student outcomes.

- On Monday, June 16, Dr. Colbert, Kelly Bohl, Beth Gonzalez, Dr. Jennifer Taiariol and Mike Latvis will travel to Genesee County to meet with Sheriff Chris Swanson and his team to learn more about and observe the I.G.N.I.T.E program in the Genesee County Jails. Wayne County Sheriff Office Chief Robert Dunlap and his team from the Wayne County Jails will accompany the RESA team to learn more about this educational program.
- Dr. Colbert is honored to serve as president of the Urban Superintendents Association of America (USAA), a national organization for superintendents across the country. Dr. Colbert has served as an active member of USAA for the past 11 years. The Association's Summer Academy convening will be held in July. Dr. Wanda Cook-Robinson, retired superintendent of Oakland Schools, serves as the executive director of that organization.
- Dr. Colbert has been appointed to the AASA Executive Committee by the current NABSE President, Dr. LaTonya Goffney, who is now president elect for the American Association of School Administrators (AASA). As president-elect of AASA, Dr. Goffney gets one appointment, and she appointed Dr. Daveda Colbert for a three-year term for the AASA Executive Committee. Dr. Colbert will transition from the AASA Governing Board to the Executive Committee. The last time Michigan had a person appointed to Executive Committee was Dr. Nick Ceglarek, Northwest Educational Services Superintendent, 2018 -2021, who is retiring in October 2025.
  - Dr. Colbert was appointed as a representative for MASA to the AASA Governing Board, by former Wayne RESA Superintendent and MASA Executive Director, Chris Wigent, during her tenure as Oak Park Superintendent in 2019, prior to transitioning to Wayne RESA.
- RESA is excited about Davis Aerospace moving back to Detroit City Airport and also about the Wayne County Aviation Aeronautics program. There was a Wayne County Aviation & Drone Programming Work Session held at Grosse Ile Airport on Monday, June 11. There is excitement about all of the summer opportunities including drone summer academies and camps being held at Detroit City and Troy Airports and in Canton to support Wayne County students and make sure they are connected to aviation and aeronautics, flying drones, airplane mechanics and much more.
  - Congratulations to MiSTEM that hosted the student drone competition in May. The event was phenomenal.
- As we close out this remarkable school year, Dr. Colbert shared two simple but powerful words – Thank You...to the RESA Board of Education and the entire RESA Administration and Staff. Thank you for your leadership, thank you for your service, thank you for your collaboration and your unwavering commitment to equity and excellence in all things education. The same thank you message is extended to our constituents. This year was not without its challenges. We faced complex issues, unexpected turns and moments that tested our resolve, but we didn't shy away. We stepped in, stepped up, showed up and showed out. In most cases, we leaned into discomfort, made courageous decisions and took risks that others might have avoided, but not us. Wayne County dares to be different, bold, courageous and impactful. And because of that boldness and courage, we witnessed real gains, real growth and sustainable success. We saw student outcomes improve. We saw teams rise. We saw what is possible when people work with heart,

purpose and unity. We led with compassion. We served with strength. And every single one of us in Wayne County's ecosystem made an impact not just on policies and practices, but on people, on our students and the educators and support staff that we work alongside and serve. From classrooms to central offices to communities, we were present. We supported, we listened, and we lifted. Together, we supported healthy, safe, thriving and impactful educational environments for teaching, learning and growth development for not only students but also for staff. We celebrated small wins such as improved graduation rates in Wayne County and major milestones like the passing of the Regional Enhancement Millage because that will carry us for six plus years and through it all, even with all that is happening in education, including the uncertainty of the budget and other things, we never lost sight of our purpose to ensure every student has access to opportunity, support and a future filled with possibility. Our work this year echoed far beyond the county. We have touched the state and the country with our work, our guidance, our service and our leadership. Remember, the RESA Multilingual Learners team, along with others, developed guidance earlier this year on students' rights that was cited by Massachusetts and Maryland Departments of Education. We have heard from our students, our families, educators and staff that they felt seen not only because of that document, but because of much more. We watched educators and support staff try new approaches and observed them flourish. We saw teams take risks and reap the reward. And most importantly, we continue to see students thrive. That is what bold, extraordinary, caring advocacy looks like. Let's keep being great Wayne RESA. It's been a year of wins that we must acknowledge and celebrate, and a year of reflection for what needs to be done differently and, in some cases, more intentionally to continue to improve outcomes.
